
Gary Moulton at Fort Clatsop

Beacon Rock: 210 and 100 years later

Lewis & Clark first sighted Beacon Rock on October 31, 1805. 110 years later, Portland businessman and philanthropist Henry J. Biddle bought it, restored the L&C name (from "Castle Rock"), and began building a trail to its peak. (Biddle was a cousin to the journals' editor). The Washington Chapter is interested in celebrating the centennial of the trail and welcomes suggestions if someone wants to lead an event.

Because both Corps campsites are behind federal security (due to the Coast Guard and Job Corps facilities there), no interpretation has been installed, even while scores of other sites have seen plaques, panels, and signage put in place since before the Bicentennial.

Now your chapter is delivering a twofold success: We will install an interpretive panel at the easternmost point of the Astoria Riverwalk, very near Tongue Point, to explain to visitors the significance of the site they can view.

We are also placing a bench there in memory of **Keith Hay**, founder of our chapter and champion of the Trail for 50 years. Both components of the project have been supported by chapter members and generous grants.

Please join us as we dedicate both, during the

"Ocian in View" festivities on November 7 (see our website for details). I'm grateful to the chapter leaders who led this project to fruition, especially **Tom Wilson** and **Lyn Trainer**. They have helped us advance our mission as "keepers of the story, stewards of the Trail".

2015 Annual Meeting in Kansas City, Missouri

Larry and Ellie McClure represented our Chapter at the Foundation's Aug. 1–6 annual meeting in Kansas City, Mo., with 150 fellow enthusiasts.

The focus was on William Clark, Native American tribes, and the Missouri River itself from 1803 time to today, with field trips to significant L&C sites in the greater Atchison, St. Joseph, and Kansas City area.

Outstanding speakers again brought new insights

into the Corps and what happened after their journey in that region.

Gerard Baker spoke at the final banquet—he served as superintendent of the L&C National Historic Trail during the bicentennial years and is a member of the Mandan/ Hidatsa Tribe (he's now retired in Montana).

The incoming president of the Foundation is Steve Lee, a fellow Northwesterner.
