

actually climbed by foot to the top.


Visiting Fort Clatsop, the site of the beached whale and the Saltmakers' Camp also puts one in the mindset of what the expedition members had to overcome as they spent the

Layne was a member for many years, co-editor of our chapter newsletter, "Worthy of Notice" [2010-2018], and board secretary [2013-2017]. Who can forget John and Layne's column in "Worthy of Notice," creating the ideal movie about the Corps of Discovery, and the perfect cast for that movie! Sadly, in recent years, Layne's failing health precluded his participation in chapter activities. Rennie and I, and John and Dee Orthmann attended Layne's memorial service in Layne's hometown of Kennewick. John's eulogy was moving, thoughtful, and yes, even funny; of course, John mentioned our chapter and the LCTA!

Right up until he passed, Rob



was thinking of us, the chapter, and the LCTA. As he sorted and downsized his extensive collection of printed materials, posters, maps, and memorabilia, he reached out, first, to the LCTA to offer a portion of his library to our library, to

Rob's knowledge of, and enthusiasm for, the story and the Trail was unsurpassed, and he generously shared his expertise with us!



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Living History in the Northwest 2025



On Saturday and Sunday, September 6th and 7th, the Seaside Museum and Historical Society. assisted by a grant from the City of Seaside Tourism Advisory Committee, will sponsor a demonstration of the Lewis and Clark Salt Makers. Members of the Pacific **Northwest Living Historians** (PNLH) will create and share the experience of the Lewis & Clark expedition's salt making efforts that were in present day Seaside in January and February 1806, bringing to life the salt camp where the explorers made salt to preserve their food for the long journey from the Pacific Coast back to St. Louis.

Visitors to the program will enter the camp and find members of the PNLH busy making salt, as they boil sea water over a fire just as the men of the Lewis and Clark

expedition did in 1806. The interpreters will also share the history and stories of the legendary expedition with everyone who comes to the beach. This program is for all ages and everyone will have the opportunity to see and ask questions about how seawater was turned into salt.

Lewis and Clark Salt Makers is a free, interactive learning opportunity for the whole family. This event is sponsored by the Seaside Museum and Historical Society and presented by the PNLH. A portion of this project was made possible through a grant from the City of Seaside Tourism Advisory Committee. This program is also supported by the Sandy Cove Inn, Del's Chevron, Seaside Public Works, and Oregon State Parks.

9:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. Saturday, 9:00 A.M. to 3:00 P.M. Sunday on the Seaside beach west of the **Avenue U and Prom intersection**.

Living History in the Northwest 2025



Imagine standing at a place where Native American people encountered the Lewis and Clark Expedition on its westward journey. On Oct. 16, 1805, the Corps of Discovery arrived at the confluence of the Snake and Columbia rivers, the location of today's Sacajawea Historical State Park, where the explorers stayed for two nights.

During Heritage Days, you can walk through history at the site where the Corps of Discovery camped. The event features a Lewis and Clark living history encampment presented by the **Pacific Northwest Living Historians** (PNLH), Mountain Man camps, Native American cultural displays, vintage steam engines and more.

Thursday and Friday (25th & 26th) will focus on visits by school groups, but the park will be open to the public. A Discover Pass (\$10 one-day or \$30 annual) is re-





FREE DAYS AT WASHINGTON STATE LANDS

Washington State Parks and the Washington Departments of Fish & Wildlife (WDFW) and Natural Resources (DNR) offer several "free days" when a Discover Pass is not required to visit these lands.

The remaining 2025 free days are:

Sept. 27: National Public Lands Day Oct. 10: World Mental Health Day Nov. 11: Veteran's Day

Free parking days apply only to day use, not overnight stays or rented facilities. Sno-Park permits are still required on free days at designated Sno-Parks during the winter season.

ROBERT HEACOCK 1957 – 2025

Robert Stuart Heacock was born to Harold and Violet (Bulich) Heacock on July 8th, 1957 in Kadlec Hospital in Richland, WA. Robert passed away July 5th, 2025, in his home, surrounded by his loved ones in Liberty Lake, WA, from a pulmonary embolism that resulted in cardiac arrest. Because of God's gracious love, he is now chatting with Lewis and Clark about their expedition and enjoying conversations with Father Serra and the other early Blackrobes who came to the Northwest, fulfilling his passion as a respected historian.

Robert grew up in the Tri-Cities area, graduating from Kamiakin High School in Kennewick, WA in 1975. He attended Columbia Basin College in Pasco, WA and then received his Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Economics from Washington State University in 1980. He also attended Eastern Washington University for Cost Accounting.

During his college years, Robert worked construction for Palouse Producers in Pullman as well as being a grain buyer in Whitman County in Washington State. After graduating, Robert began work in insurance claims and investigations when he moved to Veradale, WA. After downsizing, he moved to Liberty Lake, WA.

An avid historian, Robert enjoyed entertaining countless tourists with accurate facts on cruise boats navigating both the Snake and Columbia Rivers. He even found time to take trips on the Ohio River between St. Louis, MO and Pittsburgh, PA.

In his spare time, Robert was an avid outdoorsman. He loved to

camp all over the Pacific Northwest and hike on the beautiful trails. He enjoyed boating local lakes and sailing the Puget Sound on wooden boats.

Robert attended St. Mary Catholic Church in Spokane Valley, WA where he compiled a history of St. Mary Parish and made historical presentations of Father Junipero Serra and the Early Church in the Pacific Northwest. Robert was also active in the Knights of Columbus and Serra Club.

Robert is Preceded in death by his parents Harold and Violet Heacock. Robert is survived by his loving wife Melanie; his son Ryan and his wife Annie; Rachelle (Taft) Kortus; Patrick (Dawn) Libey; his sisters Barbara Jackson and Theresa Heacock: niece Elizabeth Jackson: and nephews William Jackson and Peter Jackson. Most notably, he is survived by 10 grandchildren— Elliotte and Greyson Kortus; Ryan, Reese, and Taylor (the Libey girls); and Hattie, Harlow, Hudson, Hazel. and Honor Heacock--all of whom were taught the art of eating ice cream by him.

The family is forever grateful to the doctors, nurses and staff at Sacred Heart Medical Center and the paramedics who compassionately treated Rob until his last breath.

On Saturday, July 12th a Rosery was held at St. Mary Catholic Parish in Spokane Valley and was followed by Funeral Mass.

Rob's passing is a great loss to all his friends in the Lewis and Clark community. His dedication as a "Keeper of the Story, Steward of the Trail" included service on the LCTA Board of Directors, as President of the Washington State Chapter, and more than two decades as chapter Secretary. He meticulously planned field trips for the chapter. Rob also contributed numerous articles to *The Orderly Report*, to the PNW Region newsletter *Course & Communication*, and the WA newsletter *Worthy of Notice*; for those efforts, I am personally deeply grateful. Rob Heacock was truly a giant in our world of Corps of Discovery devotees. May God bless and comfort his family.

Layne was a proud graduate of Kennewick High School and went on to further his education at Columbia Basin College. He started working at the SRO theater chain in high school and made many friends. There are many stories of the theater and drive in years. He had a brief stint in Walla Walla and eventually he transferred to Seattle to work at the Uptown Theater. After leaving SRO/ Regal, Lavne worked at U-Park in Seattle. He then embraced the rewarding role of a stay-at-home dad, a decision that reflected his deep commitment to family and especially to Kate, who was his pride and joy. We knew that he would excel in that role as he was a beloved uncle to his nephews and niece, in fact he was just called 'Uncle'.

He loved sports. He bowled in youth and adult leagues, played touch football with his friends, golfed and played softball, where he met his wife Julie. He enjoyed going to watch Kate play sports and even coached her T-Ball team one year. He enjoyed listening to the WSU Cougar football and the Seattle Mariner games on his transistor radio.

As we say farewell to Conrad Layne Corneliuson, we celebrate a life beautifully lived and deeply cherished. His legacy of humor, kindness, and love will continue to inspire those he left behind. Layne's story does not end here; it lives on in the hearts and memories of his family, friends, and all who were fortunate enough to have shared in his remarkable journey.

A funeral service was held on Thursday, August 7, 2025 at Mueller's Tri-Cities Funeral Home, and Layne was interred at Desert Lawn Memorial Park in Kennewick.

I met Layne as a high school freshman, entering public school for the first time after attending Catholic middle school and knowing almost nobody. Layne was the first to embrace me as a friend. That was his nature: open hearted, and always making friends. After high school we stayed in touch, and we both eventually landed in the Seattle area, where we attended a lot of Mariners and SuperSonics games together. Layne loved music, movies and history. He joined the WA State Chapter a couple of years after I did, and soon we were enjoying road trips together to L&C meetings and activities all over the northwest.

When our late friend Tim Underwood decided to step aside as editor of the *Worthy of Notice* chapter newsletter, I had an impulse to volunteer, but I was a little unsure about it. Wouldn't you know it, Layne was thinking the same thing, but he wondered if I might want to take it on together. So it was, for about eight years thereafter, that it became a ritual to get together at Layne's house every few months, and somehow cobble together a newsletter. Perhaps our most unusual notion was to imagine a Lewis and Clark movie, with a cast from the Golden Age of Hollywood. Layne worked at movie theaters for several years in his 20s, and he practically qualified as a motion picture historian. That particular newsletter project was a real joy.

Thank you, Layne, for your friendship and service to everyone in the Washington State Chapter. Above all, thank you for being my lifelong friend. — John Orthmann, Kennewick High School Class of 1981
