



ANNE SCHORZMAN 1954 – 2025

Anne was a friend of mine. A very good friend.

Anne was the first new friend I had after I moved to Boise in 1986. We met through mutual friends, and we found we had a common interest. We were both runners and loved to do the local fun runs.

She had a great sense of humor, and she made me laugh.
About almost anything — we could laugh together. While Anne and I shared many laughs over the years as well as many fun adventures, I'm here today to tell you about a more serious side of Anne.

It involved two old guys from history, namely, Meriwether Lewis, and William Clark. Our mutual friend Ruthann Caylor introduced me to the Lewis & Clark Trail Heritage Foundation in which she recruited me to be a member. Then in 1996, Ruthann and I ganged up on Anne and recruited her to join us on a road trip to Sioux City, Iowa, the site for that year's Lewis & Clark gathering. Anne soon learned why we enjoyed the organization so much - it is a great group of amateur historians who quickly became our friends. Anne, like Ruthann and myself before her, quickly became hooked. One afternoon while we were in Iowa, Anne and I played hooky and traveled to the small town of Menno, SD. Anne's father had come from that small town. Lewis and Clark gave Anne an opportunity to check out her family roots in South Dakota.

Anne's Lewis & Clark adventures included some obscure but scenic locations, including the Columbia Gorge in 1997 and Great Falls Montana in 1998. Another event in 1998 became a pivotal time in Anne's Lewis and Clark adventure. The Idaho Chapter gathering at Carol McGregor 's Raspberry Ranch in

central Idaho was where the group started planning Idaho events for the upcoming Lewis and Clark Bicentennial. No one knew at the time but this planning session would lead to one of the most successful state commemorations of the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial. Two of the participants at



that meeting were our host Carol McGregor and Anne Schorzman. Their exceptional leadership with the Idaho Lewis & Clark Trail Committee steered the very successful commemoration in Idaho. I personally can attest to this fact as I was treasurer of the LCTHF during those years and thus witnessed many of the bicentennial planning efforts and events, and I received a lot of feedback from all over the country. The Idaho effort left many "lasting legacies."

There were two official Lewis and Clark groups in Idaho, namely, the Idaho Chapter of LCTHF and the State of Idaho's Trail Committee. Anne's first job in Lewis & Clark leadership was in the year 2000, when she succeeded me as president of the Idaho chapter.

Her leadership shined in many ways. Among the many "on the trail" accomplishments during her term included working with the Oregon Chapter in cleaning up the gravesite of Jean Baptiste Charbonneau, Sacagawea's son; this took place in 2000 just outside of Jordan Valley in eastern Oregon. In 2005, she coordinated activities with the Daughters of the American Revolution to mark the birth of J.B. Charbonneau. And in

2002, working with the Nez Perce Tribe, she organized a work party with chapter members to clean up a section of land between the Potlatch and Clearwater Rivers near Arrow Junction. The tribe and locals were very pleased with these efforts.

Perhaps Anne's most important accomplishment as president was sponsoring three annual workshops for teachers in Salmon, Lolo Hot Springs, and Astoria, Oregon. More than 50 Idaho teachers participated in sessions for credit that took them to parts of the trail for extended field trips and workshop

training by Lewis & Clark scholars. The Chapter also partnered with the Idaho Department of Education, and the attendees produced instructional lessons for teachers, written by the participants. Expenses were paid with several grants which Anne successfully wrote and administered.

In 2002, Anne chaired the other Idaho committee -- Idaho Lewis & Clark Trail committee appointed by the governor. In this role, she presided over the Passages 2002 conference held in Lewiston for Bicentennial planners from Monticello, VA to Astoria, OR. The event not only showcased the Idaho plans for the bicentennial, it also brought together planners, government officials, tribal members and vendors. As head of the committee, Anne introduced US Senator Larry Craig to the large

NORM STEADMAN 1937 – 2025

Idaho has lost one of its legendary 'old timers' with the death of Norm Steadman on October 21.

Norm served as the mayor of Weippe for 53 years and as an engineer on the Clearwater National Forest for 46. He was passionate about local history and was a popular tour guide, especially on the Lolo Trail and Weippe Prairie and in the Kamiah area. He served on the state planning commission for the Lewis and Clark Bicentennial and presented programs to groups ranging from school children to out

of state hunters at the exclusive Flying B Ranch. In 1990, he arranged for use of the Weippe Community Center as part of the Lewis & Clark Trail Heritage Foundation's national convention, and was always helpful in providing information to the Idaho Governors Lewis & Clark Trail Committee and the Idaho chapter of the Foundation. Memorial donations may be sent to the Weippe Community Club, P.O. Box 351, Weippe, ID 83553. Norm will be remembered and missed with deep gratitude.

group of attendees. Sen. Craig was instrumental in securing funds from Congress to help pull off the national commemoration.

In 2003, Anne represented Idaho at the dedication of the Nez Perce Warriors monument in St. Louis, which commemorates the 1830s journey of four young Nez Perce men who had met Lewis and Clark during their journey in Idaho in 1805-1806. Unfortunately, only two survived, and two were buried in St. Louis. This 2003 monument is the only marker for their final resting place. On March 29, Anne was quoted:

"The Nez Perce warriors dedication was very special to me for several reasons. I was the 'official' representative from the governors committee and spoke on behalf of the committee. I couldn't believe the number of Nez Perce who traveled by car to get there, along with their horses. After the day-long powwow at the Missouri Historical Society, everyone went to Calvary Cemetery. It was a very cold day, but everyone was allowed to have their say. I was honored to be there amongst so many tribal folks and was truly awed by their dedication and sacred respect towards their tribal members."

Three months later in June 2003, Anne again represented the State of Idaho near Lolo Pass on the Idaho-Montana border where a monument was dedicated to the late author Stephen Ambrose, author of the still-popular *Undaunted Courage*. Anne had met Mr. Ambrose at the Lewis and Clark event in the Columbia River Gorge. Anne commented: "I remember what a beautiful blue-sky day it was for the Ambrose memorial dedication. I was sitting next to Stephanie Ambrose Tubbs and Moira Ambrose and they told me they felt Mr. Ambrose's spirit on Lolo more than anywhere else they had been with him. Evidently, Moira almost didn't make the trip, but she was totally overtaken with emotion several times. Stephanie whispered to her mother how glad she was that they hadn't missed the dedication. I'd like to think his spirit resides there in some way. He was like a colleague of Lewis & Clark rather than a historian who traveled the Trail and wrote about it. And the dedication was so well done. I think he would've been proud and honored."

This is why we enjoyed traveling to Lewis and Clark Trail - meeting so many interesting people and see so many interesting sites. We also traveled to Bismarck, North Dakota; Louisville, KY; Dillon, MT; Omaha, NE; and Sturgis, SD. Anne also traveled to Lewis & Clark meetings with her sisters, Carolyn and Cathy. In observing the sisters, I believe the gals very much enjoyed their "sister time" together.

Anne had the opportunity to meet and work with many tribal folks from the Nez Perce and Shoshone- Bannock tribes, Lewis and Clark authors, artists and even Mary Ellen Withrow. Who is Mary Ellen? At the time, she was the Treasurer of the United States and her signature appeared on all US currency during her tenure. She hailed from North Dakota and was an invited guest at the Bismarck Lewis and Clark gathering. There were so many interesting people we encountered on the trail.

Of course, we had many good laughs during all those travels — and good laughs with all those great friends. This was just one chapter in Anne's life - but I believe it was an enjoyable, successful and meaningful chapter for OUR FRIEND ANNE.



ICONIC SEASIDE SCULPTURE REDEDICATED

Thirty-five years after it was installed, a monumental statue dubbed "End of the Trail" by noted artist Stanley Wanlass was rededicated September 7 at Seaside, OR with a special plaque. Thousands of visitors to this popular tourist city are reminded of Lewis & Clark's accomplishments at the Seaside Turnaround overlooking the ocean.

Mayor Steve Wright chose this date to coincide with the annual Lewis & Clark Salt Makers event. This year nine interpreters of the Pacific Northwest Living Historians participated, boiling seawater to make salt 24-7 at their weekend camp on the beach several blocks south near the site of the actual 1806 salt cairn. The city sponsored both events. Former Seaside Mayor Joyce Williams originally commissioned the Turnaround statue, but recognition of the artist was not prominent.

Some 100 onlookers gathered at the statue to celebrate. LCTA Oregon Chapter member Mark Johnson and Washington State Chapter member Glen Allison left their saltmaking duties briefly to make remarks, portraying Corps of Discovery explorers George Gibson and Hugh McNeal. Brandy Wanlass, granddaughter of Stanley Wanlass—who also created several other Lewis & Clark bronzes on the Oregon and Washington coast—unveiled the plaque.

Wanlass lives in Utah, but asked his granddaughter to share his words: "I am a hopeless idealist and romantic. Life is short but art is long. I wanted to leave something edifying, of significant beauty and a tribute to the spirit, dignity, and excellence of man."

2026 FREE DAYS AT WASHINGTON STATE LANDS

Washington State Parks, the Washington Department of Fish & Wildlife (WDFW) and Department of Natural Resources (DNR) offer several "free days" when a Discover Pass is not required to visit these lands.

Jan. 1 – New Year's Day & First Day Hikes

Jan. 19 – Martin Luther King Jr. Day March 9 – Billy Frank Jr.'s Birthday March 19 – State Parks 113th Birthday

April 22 – Earth Day June 6-7 – Free Fishing Weekend June 19 – Juneteenth

Aug. 9 – Smokey Bear's Birthday Sept. 26 – National Public Lands Day

Oct. 10 – World Mental Health Day Nov. 11 – Veterans Day

Free parking days apply only to day use (not overnight stays or rented facilities). Sno-Park permits are still required on free days at designated Sno-Parks during the winter season.

The annual Discover Pass is \$50.00 and is valid at all State Parks, WDFW and DNR lands. A day-use pass costs \$11.50.


