I'm happy to announce that we have entered into a partnership with the <u>State of Kentucky Department of Tourism</u> and they have become our first State level financial sponsor for the Lewis and Clark Trail Experience.

Kentucky played a vital role in the Lewis and Clark Expedition, serving as a key recruitment and preparation site. William Clark, who co-led the journey, spent much of his early life in Kentucky, and it was at the Falls of the Ohio near Louisville that he and Meriwether Lewis met to plan the expedition. skilled members hailed from Kentucky, including Sergeant Charles Floyd, the expedition's only casualty, and York, Clark's enslaved man, the "tenth young man from Kentucky".

The state also holds significant historic sites tied to the expedition. Big Bone Lick State Historic Site was visited by Lewis in 1803 and Clark in 1807 to collect fossils for President Jefferson. Historic Locust Grove was home to Clark's family and a gathering place for expedition members. The Filson Historical Society preserves expedition records, ensuring Kentucky's contributions

to this historic journey remain well remembered.

Thomas Jefferson's instructions to them were clear: "Your observations are to be taken with great pains & accuracy, to be entered distinctly, & intelligibly for others as well as yourself,... several copies of these, as well as of your other notes, should be made at leisure times, & put into the care of the most trustworthy of your attendants, to guard, by multiplying them, against the accidental losses to which they will be exposed."



### Jefferson River Canoe Trail Acquires New Campsite!



The Jefferson River Chapter has completed acquisition of its newest campsite on the Jefferson River Canoe Trail, a recreational trail along the Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail. The 4.43-acre property is a fragment of the former Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railroad right-of-way. It is located four miles downstream from Lewis and Clark Caverns State Park, and twenty-six miles upstream from the confluence of the Jefferson and Madison rivers that comprise the beginning of the Missouri River.

This is the third property purchased by the Jefferson River Chapter, and the ninth campsite along the canoe trail, which includes four campsites designated on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) lands and two campsites on state lands. The new campsite sits only one

mile downstream from the existing Brown Bear campsite on BLM land, making it a duplicate campsite. However, an old channel of the Jefferson River loops around the new property, adding approximately 8 acres of de facto state land around the parcel, including a substantial duck pond.


By walking across the adjacent BNSF Railway spur line to Harrison, used only about twice a year by trains, visitors can access 160 acres of state land, which otherwise has no public access. For the price of four acres, the Jefferson River Chapter has effectively secured 172 acres of public access.

A longtime chapter supporter offered a \$10,000 challenge match, and other chapter members rose to the challenge, completing the match over a two-month time period. Added to a nest egg of funds already in the bank, the chapter was able to finalize the purchase at the end of January.


The chapter will name the site and establish a formal campsite there, including historical signage about the Lewis and Clark Expedition's experiences in the immediate vicinity. The Jefferson River Chapter is seeking to acquire additional properties to provide convenient camping along the entire length of the Jefferson River. Once complete, all properties will be handed off to the BLM or other public entity for long term stewardship. Chapter members are planning a canoe expedition to visit the new campsite this spring.
