## Unraveling Trail Mysteries: The "Pointy Man" & Jean Baptiste Charbonneau

One of the best parts of working with the Lewis and Clark Trail is uncovering fascinating historical details that challenge and inspire. Two recent discoveries sparked my curiosity, and I invite you to help solve these mysteries.

While preparing for a presentation, I revisited the *Administrative History of the Lewis and Clark Trail Foundation*, funded by the National Park Service. I found the origin story of the iconic "pointy man" image—Bob Davenport's famous painting of Lewis and Clark (that hangs in the LCTA office in Great Falls).

The references place its setting 18 miles north of present-day Omaha, likely from the Iowa side, pointing west. Now, my curiosity is piqued. Where exactly did Davenport stand when he painted this image we so closely associate with the Trail? I'm determined to find out.

The second mystery comes from our Trip Inspirations project, which connects key sites along the Trail, including Jean Baptiste Charbonneau's grave in the Oregon high desert. He died while en route to the Montana goldfields, traveling by stagecoach. But what route did he take? Did it cross Donner Pass to Reno, then north along modern U.S. 95—or was there another path?

Now, I turn to you, fellow trail enthusiasts—if you share my curiosity, help me unravel this mystery! Do you have insights into Charbonneau's final journey? Have you stood where Bob Davenport once painted? Let's put on our history sleuthing caps and "proceed on" together.



#### LCTA Grant Awards in Action

The Lewis & Clark Trail Alliance's <u>Stewardship Endowment Committee</u> awarded grant funding to 15 organizations for use in 2025. These projects focus on actions that have positive impact on the Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail and the public's education about the expedition.

In this edition we share with you the story of two grants for 2025 that will help educate the public, particularly schoolchildren, about the Lewis and Clark Expedition as well as today's importance of cultural awareness and homelands.

## Sioux City Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center

In Sioux City, Iowa, the Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center received a \$7,500 grant to fund public performance related to its Wall of Unsung Heroes project that, when completed in the spring, will depict

lesser-known expedition members and Native Americans who assisted the explorers. The goal is to reach audiences from diverse demographics and backgrounds, with an emphasis on disadvantaged and at-risk youth in the local community.

The performances will feature the Many Moccasins Dance Troupe, indigenous music from the Wall of Unsung Heroes project, and a professional hoop dancer, Starr Chief Eagle, a member of the Sicangu (Rosebud) Lakota Sioux Tribe in South Dakota.

One of the Midwest's best known hoop dancers, she is part of a generation of women bringing their talents to what was originally a male practice.





## Nez Perce County Historical Society and Museum

In Lewiston, Idaho, the Nez Perce County
Historical Society received a \$1,500 grant to
help with honorariums for schools and
nonprofit organizations to host events
featuring quality Lewis and Clark and Nez
Perce speakers.

The events will take place along the Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail in north-central Idaho. The grant will help the historical society and museum's speakers bureau continue its tradition of many years of providing quality speakers who help educate the public.

Topics will range from information about Nez Perce tribal homelands and culture to the

importance of trail stewardship.

This was no Virginia or Kentucky belle who would expect a gentleman to tie her bonnet and ease her way through the American wilderness. This was a healthy, vital, clever, generous, resourceful, and thoughtful woman who had essential field skills that no member of the Corps of Discovery could emulate. The simple truth is that without Sacagawea the story of the Lewis and Clark Expedition is impoverished. It's much less interesting. We need her to deepen this story and give it more magic. In some sense we continue to aggrandize her (as usual on our own terms), but her centrality to America's love affair with Lewis and Clark is undeniable. We continue to colonize her, I believe, to serve our mythological and narrative purposes. For what could be better than an Indian princess who helped us conquer the continent and died in a calico dress? Trauma. Resilience. Resourcefulness.

## Explore & Preserve the Lolo Trail Join Our Summer Tour!

The Idaho Chapter of the Lewis & Clark Trail Alliance invites you to camp along the historic Lolo Trail and help maintain its interpretive signs this summer. This self-supported trip (i.e. bring your own food and gear) includes two weekend outings:

- June 20-22, 2025 (West Side) Camp near Musselshell Meadows and visit sites like Lewis and Clark Grove, El Dorado Creek, and Rocky Ridge.
- July 11-13, 2025 (East Side) Camp near Powell, Idaho, exploring Lolo Pass, Snowbank, Bear's Oil and Roots Camp, and more.

This trip blends trail preservation with immersive history, retracing Lewis and Clark's rugged

journey across the Bitterroot Mountains from Lolo, Montana, over Lolo Pass to Weippe, Idaho. While inspecting and repairing interpretive signs, we'll also explore some of the most significant Corps of Discovery sites along the Lolo Trail. Expect rough, dusty roads—high-clearance vehicles with durable tires are recommended. LCTA membership is not required to participate in these outings.
