Charbonneau, who left this county some weeks ago, with two companions, for Montana Territory. The letter is from one of the party, who says Mr. C., was taken sick with mountain fever, on the Owybee, and died after a short illness.

Among the most significant records they kept was a manuscript listing the names of the different Native American nations and tribes they encountered.

This document, now housed in the American Philosophical Society in Philadelphia, provides a rare glimpse into the Indigenous communities along their route.


This enumeration of Native peoples offers crucial insight into the complexities of westward expansion.

#### LCTA Grant Awards in Action

School districts along the Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail and in other areas of the nation typically teach fourth graders about the Lewis and Clark Expedition. With this in mind, the Lewis & Clark Alliance last year updated its <a href="Corps of Discovery Curriculum Guide">Corps of Discovery Curriculum Guide</a> to help educators teach about the expedition.

This year the Lewis & Clark Trail Alliance's <u>Stewardship Endowment Committee</u> awarded grant funding to two projects focusing on fourth-grade students. The organizations conducting the two projects are among 15 that received 2025 LCTA grant funding.

#### Missouri River Relief

The <u>Missouri River Relief</u> (MRR) received \$10,000 to provide fourth-grade students with field trips on the Missouri River during the annual <u>Missouri River Days</u> in late April and early May.

These trips will provide over 600 students from 11 school districts in Boone and Cole Counties, MO, with first-hand experience on the waterway. Guided by Missouri River Relief (MRR) educators, students will explore the river's natural beauty, learn about riparian ecosystems, fisheries, and discover local connections to the Lewis and Clark Expedition.

One activity is a "Through the Eyes of An Explorer" experience where students review sketches from Lewis and Clark's journals and then—in the spirit of how these journals so often referred to Nature's beauty—learn to create their own watercolor sketches.

#### **Nez Perce County Historical Society**

The Nez Perce County Historical Society and Museum, Lewiston, Idaho, received \$1,000 to provide stipends for reenactors, local historians, tribal participants and storytellers to present at the 27<sup>th</sup> annual fourth-grade Rendezvous, a time that gives students an in-depth look at the Lewis and Clark Expedition and local history.

The May 8, 2025 Rendezvous for fourth graders in the Lewiston School District will show how Lewis and Clark and local history are important in their education.

# Explore & Preserve the Lolo Trail Join Our Summer Tour!

The Idaho Chapter of the Lewis & Clark Trail Alliance invites you to camp along the historic Lolo Trail and help maintain its interpretive signs this summer. This self-supported trip (i.e. bring your own food and gear) includes two weekend outings:

- June 20-22, 2025 (West Side) Camp near Musselshell Meadows and visit sites like Lewis and Clark Grove, El Dorado Creek, and Rocky Ridge.
- July 11-13, 2025 (East Side) Camp near Powell, Idaho, exploring Lolo Pass, Snowbank, Bear's Oil and Roots Camp, and more.

This trip blends trail preservation with immersive history, retracing Lewis and Clark's rugged journey across the Bitterroot Mountains from Lolo, Montana, over Lolo Pass to Weippe, Idaho. While inspecting and repairing interpretive signs, we'll also explore some of the most significant Corps of Discovery sites along the Lolo Trail. Expect rough, dusty roads—high-clearance vehicles with durable tires are recommended. LCTA membership is not required to participate in these outings.


Owensboro to Cave-in-Rock



Follow the Lewis & Clark Expedition as they mov down the Ohio in early November 1803. Starting in Owensboro, Kentucky, visit ancient Indigenous mounds and pioneer river towns in both Indiana and Kentucky and end at one of the hideouts.
