

LCTA Grant Awards in Action

The Lewis & Clark Trail Alliance's 2025 Stewardship Endowment Grants help 15 organizations focus on speakers, events, displays, brochures, and other creative projects that tell the expedition's story. Here is a look at two of the grants:

Falls of the Ohio River Foundation

At the Falls of the Ohio River State Park Interpretive Center in Indiana, a \$5,000 grant to the Falls of the Ohio Foundation will be used to give visitors easier access to a popular Lewis and Clark statue. Made by the late sculptor Carol Grende, the larger-than-life bronze statue is often called the "handshake statue." It shows Meriwether Lewis and William Clark reaching out to shake hands when the two friends met up near Falls of the Ohio River in 1803.

The statue is a significant educational feature for visitors, including 3,000 local students annually, who go to the interpretive center to learn about the expedition and other information.

Travelers' Rest Connection

Travelers' Rest Connection, which provides visitor services at Travelers' Rest State Park near Missoula, Montana, will use a \$4,000 grant to promote a creative exhibit of 34 kites inspired by the Lewis and Clark explorers.

The exhibit, which opens April 13, was organized by Terry Zee Lee, a nationally renowned kite designer and flyer. During the opening festivities, she and mascots from Missoula community organizations will fly kites. Kids will be able to color their own kites to fly.

For the exhibit, kite builders throughout the U.S. researched Lewis and Clark quotes and fashioned a fascinating flying history of the expedition. The designs give tributes to people, events or natural resources encountered by the explorers. The kites will be displayed at the Travelers' Rest visitor center and other public places.







In the late 1940s, after completing his Pulitzer Prizewinning history of the Rocky Mountain fur trade, Across the Wide Missouri, the brilliant and iconoclastic historian, essayist, novelist, and conservationist Bernard DeVoto set out to write a book on the Lewis and Clark Expedition. For several summers, he and his wife Avis (famous in her own right as collaborator with Julia Child on Mastering the Art of French Cooking) retraced much of the route of the Expedition from St. Louis to the Pacific and back. By the time the couple had completed their travels and DeVoto had finished his archival research, he was prepared not only to begin his book on Lewis and Clark but also his widelyacclaimed condensation of the Lewis and Clark journals
