
Watch

LCTA Grant Awards in Action

The Lewis & Clark Trail Alliance's 2025 Stewardship Endowment Grants help 15 organizations focus on speakers, events, displays, brochures, and other creative projects that tell the expedition's story. Here is a look at two of the grants:

Historical Sign Replacements

The most viewed educational offerings along the Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail are outdoor wayside displays that provide information about what the explorers did in a local area and, in many instances, additional information about indigenous populations and local ecology.

Most of the signage was erected during the 2003-06 Bicentennial Celebration of the expedition. Over the last two decades, some displays have deteriorated due to weather or unfortunately damaged due to vandalism.

The upkeep and replacement of these important educational exhibits has been a priority of the Lewis and Clark Trail Alliance over the years. Of the 15 grants funded in 2025, the Trail Stewardship Grant Program provided funding to two organizations to replace signage.

Elk Point South Dakota

The city of Elk Point, S.D., received \$1,000 to replace deteriorated signage at the interpretive site where the Expedition camped in the days after the death and burial of Sgt. Charles Floyd.

The Corps had an important decision to make in <u>selecting a new sergeant</u>. On August 26, 1804, the men elected Patrick Gass as Sgt. Floyd's replacement.

Mouth of the Platte

In a 40-mile stretch of the Missouri River in the area of Omaha, Neb., and Council Bluffs, Iowa, an assessment of 15 exhibits found that 40 informational panels needed replacement.

The Mouth of the Platte Chapter of the Lewis & Clark Trail Alliance applied for and received a \$10,000 grant to work with other local groups to replace panels in displays in 15 parks and public spaces.

Mark your calendars for this memorable and historic Annual Gathering. Rumor has it a keelboat might make an appearance!







Who Built the Barge?

In his journal during the voyage, Lewis himself, and others who saw it, called his big boat a "barge." The drawings of this boat made by Captain William Clark and other references in the journals also establish its type clearly.

For many years, the fact that Lewis went down the Ohio River with his barge and other smaller boats was not widely known. There is a well-documented tradition that one or more of the Lewis boats was built in Elizabeth, Pennsylvania, but most historians today conclude that his barge was built in Pittsburgh.


Until 2003, the belief was that it had been built at one of the boatyards along the banks of the Monongahela River (i.e., near Pittsburgh). The research outlined in Patricia Lowry's August 3, 2003, Pittsburgh Post-


