The Hidden Gems

Discovery has different connotations—but personal discovery is unique. For those drawn to the story of Lewis and Clark, that sense of wonder, curiosity, and courage lives on. At heart, we are all explorers.

We all love the crown jewels along the route—but the Lewis and Clark National Historic Trail is also rich with hidden gems that invite you to slow down, step off the beaten path, and connect with the journey in a more personal way. Have you explored the Natchez Trace near Hohenwald, Tennessee, where the Meriwether Lewis Monument marks the site of the explorer's mysterious and still-debated death? Have you stood along the Missouri River at Fort Pierre, South Dakota, where the Corps of Discovery first met the Teton Sioux in a pivotal moment of diplomacy and tension? Or hiked the short trail to Tower Rock in Montana, the same soaring landmark that caught Lewis's eye in 1805? Perhaps you've experienced the quiet beauty of Patit Creek near Dayton, Washington, where life-size statues of the expedition members capture a rare moment of rest on the open prairie. These places may be less visited—but they offer powerful, personal connections to the past, and moments that stay with you long after the visit ends.

These places aren't just historical, they are alive with meaning, memory, and possibility. Whether you're walking in their footsteps or exploring from home through our <u>digital resources</u>, let the Trail guide you to new places, new stories, and new reflections.





Lewis and Clark Backcountry Byway

Take a drive on the breathtaking Lewis and Clark Backcountry Byway. This remote route recognizes the area where Meriwether Lewis and William Clark began their explorations of the Pacific Northwest. Visitors will find that many of the forests and meadows on this drive look much the same as when these explorers journeyed to the area in 1805.

" We travelled 20 miles this day, and encamped at a place where the mountains come close to the river The man who had remained behind at the first village and the other who had gone with the Indians to their fishing place, both joined us here. The Indians gave them five salmon to bring to us: and he that had stayed for a horse, brought one with him."

-William Clark August 21, 1805





Rails to Trails Update - Jefferson River

The proposed Ruby Valley Rail Trail would span approximately 19 miles, connecting the communities of Twin Bridges, Sheridan, Laurin, and Alder along the inactive Montana Rail Link (MRL) right-of-way. This trail would serve cyclists, walkers, equestrians, and potentially winter recreation users, providing a safe and scenic path through Ruby Valley ranchlands with great views of the Ruby Range and Tobacco Root Mountains.

The Ruby Valley Rail Trail offers a rare alignment of opportunity, manageability, and community benefit. It is less contentious and logistically simpler than other large-scale trail projects in Montana, with a strong chance of near-term success. We believe this corridor could serve as a flagship model for rural trail conversion in the state.


