We are happy to be able to bring new life to archival video footage that was recorded as part of the Tribal Legacy Project.

From 2003 through 2006, the National Park Service hosted a national touring exhibit called Corps of Discovery II: 200 Years to the Future that traveled to 22 states and set up at 95 venues to commemorate the Bicentennial of the Lewis and Clark expedition and its impact on American history.

Amy Mossett of the Mandan/Hidatsa Tribe recorded this segment which explores the death of Sakakawea

House

The Lewis & Clark Boat House is the permanent home of the Discovery Expedition of St. Charles replicas of the keelboat and pirogues used by Lewis and Clark.

Situated beside the Missouri River at Bishop's Landing in charming historic St. Charles, Missouri, the educational facility features exhibits relating to the Lewis and Clark expedition as well as the Missouri River ecosystem.

The Boat House is located on the lower level. It houses the full-scale replicas of the boats used by Lewis & Clark and the Corps of Discovery.


Because the Alliance is the official archive of the Commemoration, these

ornaments are now preserved in the Sherman Library and Archives and brought to life for these special events.


