Ste. Genevieve is the oldest permanent European town in Missouri, especially known for the vertical log architecture, with over 30 buildings still standing built from about 1790 to 1820. This town existed at the time Lewis and Clark made their way north from the Ohio River. They even mentioned in a journal that they passed by and stopped on an island just north of town.

According to Clark's journal for November 28,

Imagine what life was like in 1803! This video takes you on a journey through the grounds of Historic Locust Grove, once a bustling hub for early 19th-century frontier life. Explore the daily lives of the Croghan family, their enslaved workers, and the many travelers who passed through this estate, including famous visitors like George Rogers Clark and even Meriwether Lewis and William Clark.

From the architecture of the Federal-style mansion to the tools, trades, and traditions of the time, experience the sights


In the first episode of this archival three part video, Sandra McFarland, now Administrator of the Nez Perce (Nee-Me-Poo) National Historic Trail, takes us on a journey through the incredible history of the Nez Perce Tribe and their interactions with Lewis and Clark. In the fall of 1805, as the Corps of Discovery passed through Nez Perce lands, the Tribe provided essential aid to 1803, the expedition arrived at a landing on the other side of "St. Genevie". By the time of the expedition, the population of New Ste. Genevieve was around 1000. About one week later, Clark gave further descriptions of the town. He wrote that the town was primarily French with about 120 families.


# Big Medicine: A Focus on York Watch the inspiring trailer for the


